The year began with the Students' Union and the Senior Leadership Team working together to form a HE Student Voice Representatives Team. We were joined by enthusiastic and academically driven students in the HE department who helped us throughout the year to critically analyse and improve the Learning and Teaching Standards within their specific subject areas.

Our mission to provide 'Outstanding technical and professional learning' will not be possible if the resources provided are not suitable. Therefore since the beginning of the academic year my main aim was to provide the HE students with a space to learn and develop independently during their free time. By the end of February 2016, we had a brand new HE room equipped with computers supporting the latest technical software ready to be used by all HE students. The room has now turned into a HE learning hub where students work together in groups and individually outside their lesson time.

My secondary aim was to raise awareness of student issues within HE. Since we are a very small cohort, it is very easy for our needs to not surface above the noise without a strong lead. However, the SLT at Dudley College have been very cooperative and attentive to every issue brought forward. From small issues such as regularly updated notice board in the HE room to the quality of assignment feedback; we received prompt solutions. I also had the opportunity to represent the HE Student Voice at all the Learner Board meetings. I took the opportunity to put forward suggestions provided by them to improve the Learning and Teaching Standards.

According to Chapter B5 (student Engagement) of the UK Quality Code for Higher Education by the QAA, the participation of students in quality enhancement and quality assurance process, resulting in:

Improvement of their educational experience is necessary. The Students' Union and the Senior Management Team have organised a group of focused students who come together every 4-6 weeks and discuss ways to enhance the teaching and learning experience at Dudley College.



The first meeting took place on 15th of February and discussions around the subjects of course induction, guest lecturers/lecture sessions at universities, HE specific resources, work placement opportunities and policy reviews such as late submission and course review took place. The students gave their honest feedback and as a result of which I have started to work on several more small projects. One of them includes exploring the opportunities surrounding Erasmus to help plan summer work opportunities for HE students.

I aim to assist the college in following their vision. Having the opportunity to represent the HE Student voice whilst being the Pre-grad officer of the Students' Union and a Student Governor, I hope to achieve much more in the academic year of 2016-2017.

In Dudley College, statistics acquired from the college Counselling department states there are over 300 students suffering with mental health issues with a steady increase year on year - Not to mention the students that don't come forward. Last year alone there were 262 females and 110 males suffering with mental health issues. The three major causes are:

 - Anxiety
- Self & Identity

We are creating a booklet that will allow external organisations to place their opportunities.


Students will then be able to see what opportunities are available and find out where they can get more information!

It allows the members of our union to be able to raise a mandate with the national leaders, so they are able to carry out work on our behalf. We are also able to request support if needed.



Our annual Holocaust Memorial event took place in January, where we saw over 300 people from across Dudley attend in remembrance of the tragic events of the holocaust. It is staggering that years ago the event started at Dudley library with less than 10 people in attendance and now the service is attended by hundreds. During the service Holocaust survivor Henri Obstfeld talked about his personal experience during the second world war, and how he narrowly avoided being caught by the Nazis. The service was closed by the lighting of a candle and one minute silence.



The Students' Union President read a poem to reflect the Holocaust Memorial 2017 theme 'How can life go on?' before welcoming Henri to the stage.



The annual Holocaust Memorial service was held once again in the great hall which was filled with over 300 people from the Dudley community, local schools, religious groups and Dudley College classes.

Vince Cable & NUS Vice President visit



On 17th January Vince Cable (ex secretary of state for business) & NUS (Vice President of Further Education, Vice President of Society & Citizenship, and one staff member) came in to Dudley College to speak to the students to help shape the policy that Vince Cable will be writing to the government - participation was high and students got their concerns across regarding the Sainsbury review.

The purpose of this event was for students to feel comfortable with giving their uncompromised opinion of the education reforms and what they would like to see from it in the future. The comments made were all positive towards Dudley College, however there were some criticism for the structure of education, and the reforms that are going to take place.



Dudley Politics Live!



For the third year in a row, Dudley Politics Live is back and better than ever before! From the five main political parties, there were representatives to state the views of their party, in which the students would vote for whoever's response they thought was the best! Students from all over the Dudley borough came to the event - Dudley Sixth A level politics students, Bishop Milner & Dormston schools all totalling together nearly 100 students!

The event covered three main topics which the students felt would affect them most, which included: mental health, tuition fees & Brexit. Once each representative heard the question, they responded in random order with 2 minutes maximum for their response.

After the audience heard their responses, they would vote with their cards whose response was best for them and once shown, they would mark down who they voted for on each topic on their tracker cards.

Student Council Term 2

Term 2 Student Council took place in February, where the Students' Union gave feedback to the student body on what we have been doing so far in the year.

We also had guest speakers in from Citizens UK & NCS The Challenge.

Citizens UK delivered a presentation on the impact that can be made if people come together and lobby for change.

They also explained to students what the upcoming Mayoral election is about, and announced that the Students' Union are taking up to 50 students on the 29th March to the university of Birmingham Mayoral Election pre assembly.

The National Citizen Service gave council information about their organisation and what they can offer to students.

Fairtrade Pop Up Café



To raise awareness of Fairtrade and what benefits it has for the workers, we set up a café in our Base room where students could get a tea, coffee or even a hot chocolate as well as banana (all Fairtrade). Fairtrade literature was available on the tables as well as a slideshow showing the benefits and what working conditions are like for some if Fairtrade isn't involved.

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
