One of our annual events, the FREE citizencard allows us to give as many students a s possible a chance to get a free age ID card, and this year over 300 students applied for theirs for free saving our students over £4500! Every year the SU work with Dudle y Trading Standards to offer the Citizen card, which is a government approved form o f identification that can be used as a proof of age to buy age restricted items or enter areas. This saves students taking out their passports or driving license, and at a much considerably cheaper price, a citizencard is the best way to go!

#### Campaigns - Save Our Disability & LAC Youth Services Campaign!

Recently, the council has announced their new proposal to cut youth services right ac ross the Dudley Borough, resulting in dozens of redundancies, and hundreds of youn g people left unsure about the future.

Disabilities Officer for the SU Morgan Sivitar has accessed many of the Disability You th groups across the borough over the years and says 'The Council believe drafting in the voluntary and community sector to replace the services lost is an alternative, but members of the clubs and concerned parents/carers do not feel that this will work and could lead to the closure of the clubs. Many of the disability youth workers have work ed for the service for many years, are professionals and have built up relationships wi th these young people. The Council have not asked the young people or carers what their view is which is very frustrating. Those with disabilities often find change traumat ising and the more future notice of any change the better. I do not feel the Council have put young people or the community first in any of these decisions. Many of the young people that access the youth groups have very limited social opportunities, losing familiar faces and ways of working could be highly detrimental'.

Many of the students that attend Dudley College access the youth groups and the SU wholeheartedly support any campaign to save the service as does local MP Ian Austin

#### **Promoting Student Voice - Make Your Mark Ballot**

The UK youth parliament, wanted to give thousands of young people a chance to ma ndate their representatives to debate on issues that matter most to them. This resulte d in the campaign of 'Make Your Mark', which saw a ballot run in schools & colleges u p & down the country, giving students a choice of 10 different matters to choose from.

Morgan Siviter SU Disabilities Officer is also a member of the local youth council, led on this ballot across all the campuses.

Local councillor Hilary Bills and Leader of the Council Patrick Harley came along to h elp out with the ballot touring Evolve and Aspire on the way.

The total votes cast at Dudley College were 346, with Mental Health being the top pri ority, followed by Protect LGBT+ People & votes at 16.

The SU have prioritised Mental Health as one of its key areas of work over the last fe w years and it was no shock at growing awareness of the issue as it is a large contributing factor to the ill health of more and more young people.

PM Theresa May has recently announced plans to make mental health an everyday c oncern and has committed new support for schools with every secondary school in th e country to be offered mental health first aid training and new trials to look at how to strengthen the links between schools and local NHS mental health staff. We feel that this offer needs to be extended to all post 16 education and we will be lobbying decisi on makers on this issue.

This is due to help the colleges counselling services out, as many of the referrals do not need counselling, but there isn't enough support in the college to help them wit h the lower level issues. If we win the bid, then the union will be able to hire a mental health professional to lead the group in the right direction. If successful, then this sho uld, in time, help to boost students wellbeing, grades & attendance.


