Students' Union Report to Corporation


November 2020 to June 2021

Student Opinion Survey Autumn Term 2020

This report outlines the findings from the Student survey carried out in December to gather student opinion on the pandemic and who well the college has adapted to government guidelines and the national lockdown/s. The Student Union offered an ascensive of a prize to gain responses, they advertised the survey though Class Representative training sessions our social media platforms, the website and Myday. With this effort the Union received 292 responses before it closed on the 18th December.

Back in November and December Officers and volunteers of the SU worked incredibly hard to run collection activities for the Black Country Food Bank and Operation Santa. A project group of 12 students worked together to deliver collection shifts in Dudley Town and spread the word between their peers and staff. We extended the Food Bank Collection to include Operation Santa too after being approached by the organisers who were aware of our support for this activity over past years. Their collection helped over 6,200 children in the Dudley Borough, a record breaking year for them.




Competition Time

Mental Health Ambassadors

We all know that mental wellbeing continues to be a priority to the success of our students. The SU continued their peer led support activity – the Mental Health Ambassador Project' in association with Dudley Young Health Champions, recruiting 15 students to develop their own peer led activities and campaigns. The focus of the most successful projects were on Bereavement and Grief, Generalised and Social Anxiety and Depression.

All Health champions completed the European Health Champion certification and have been involved in other community projects such as the Dudley Borough Health Forum.

Looking forward the champions are focusing on Anxiety post the pandemic and what will most support students to look after their mental wealth when attending college either for the first tie or returning.

Some of the Ambassadors also chose to take up additional volunteering as Covid-19 Young Health Champions. They spread clear messaging amongst young people and their communities about the risks of covid and the requirements from Government.

Holocaust Memorial and Lessons from Auschwitz

Once again Dudley SU worked alongside, Lord Austin of Dudley, and Dudley College to organise the borough's annual commemoration which is attended by VIPs, faith leaders, members of the community and students from across the Dudley.

We had the great honour of being joined by Holocaust Survivor, Manfred Goldberg BEM, Manfred was awarded the BEM in the Queen's New Year's Honours List in 2018 in recognition for his work in Holocaust education.

We also heard recounts from James Hubbard who took part in last year's Holocaust Education Trust Lessons from Auschwitz Project.

Every year the SU supports a number of students to sign up and participate in the training to become LFA ambassadors. This year 5 new students have attended the course which was delivered online. Next academic year they will be disseminating messages of hope and understanding as part of their ongoing commitment to the College and LFA as ambassadors.

The service is an opportunity to ensure that the Holocaust, Nazi Persecution and subsequent genocides are not forgotten, trivialised or denied. We will remember and continue the campaign against injustice, hatred and discrimination which has always been central to the role of Students' Unions and Trade Unions.

The event itself was held online and attracted just under 300 live views – it was a brilliant learning curve for all involved!

LBGTQ+ Community club activity and support

• LGBTQ+ Club organised a forum event for all students with a number of guest speakers. Dudley hate crime reporting, the What Centre spoke on sexual health, personal experiences of being LBGTQ in Dudley College community were shared, member of college staff spoke about the commitment from the college to the community. Representative from the National Union of Students spoke about the importance of the work that Dudley SU was doing and the position of NUS in supporting SU's

The Committee held the event on MS Teams, and had guest speakers: Kat Lafferty - from the community safety team who talked about the importance of reporting hate crime, Stuart Steele spoke about living with MS, defeating the odds and how having a positive outlook is beneficial to health, Leo Adams the disability representative at NUS spoke about the importance of representation in society and how attitudes need to change so that accessibility is no longer an issue.

The hour-long event was attended by 22 students and had an excellent review in the feedback responses. We hope to make this an annual termly event in the future.

- We attended different focus groups, to get a national picture of the hardships Students were facing due to the pandemic which collectively became the national NUS, Students Deserve Better campaign

rebranded from Student Council, the Get together gives students from across all curriculums the opportunity to get together and find out what their SU has been doing for them, receive feedback on Officer activity and the opportunity for students to participate in motions for debate. The motions that have been passed into SU campaign priority work can be seen below:

Safety on Campus – addressing Lad culture, Sexual harassment, hate crime, and the increasing knife crime in the area Respecting Hidden Disabilities– asking the college to be listed on the hidden disability website as a place where it is recognised, to set up their own Voluntary scheme so that staff can easily identify disabled students.

Trans Inclusion – to allow preferred names and pronouns on college systems and the development of broader trans inclusion support

Services expansion - services like the SU, student finance, student services and the library to be mirrored into Brierley Hill PIP reform – to standardize PIP sessions and open them out to adult students what wish to participate, having PIP session centralised on Teams assures the quality and standard of delivery. Focus on Mental Health – to locate and create open spaces around campus for the purpose of mental health gardens or seating areas where students and staff could go and reset their mental state
