Kaynat brings a wealth of experience, having served for two years as Campus Leader for Inspired. She is currently completing an IT Digital and Programming course and will be making history as the first-ever SU President from the Brierley Hill Learning Quarter.

Kaynat will officially take office on July 1st, and we couldn't be more excited to see her lead. Please join us in congratulating Kaynat on her

Presidential Handover: Jack to Kaynat

Throughout June, we have facilitated a comprehensive month-long presidential handover between outgoing President Jack and incoming President Kaynat. This structured transition period ensured a smooth and effective transfer of knowledge, responsibilities, and ongoing project work. Jack supported Kaynat with in-depth briefings on key campaigns, stakeholder relationships, and the strategic direction of the Union, while also providing guidance on day-to-day operations and leadership expectations. The extended handover allowed Kaynat to shadow Jack, engage with staff and students, and begin shaping her priorities with confidence and continuity. This proactive approach has laid strong foundations for a successful new term, maintaining momentum and ensuring students remain at the heart of the Union's work.

Kaynat's Presidential Statement



"I joined Dudley Students' Union in my first year of college. Before becoming involved, I wasn't very confident and often found it difficult to engage with others in public settings. However, joining the SU became a turning point in my personal development.

Inspired by the opportunities around me, I decided to run for the role of Campus Leader – and I was successfully elected. Before the Christmas break, I organised my very first event, which helped build my skills in planning and leadership. Throughout the year, I worked closely with the SU on a number of projects and even had the chance to attend my first national student

conference in Blackpool, which was a valuable learning experience.

In my second year, I once again ran for the Campus Leader role. This time, I was even more focused on raising student voices and addressing the issues they were facing. It was a rewarding year, although not without its challenges. Unfortunately, not all staff were supportive of the initiatives we were trying to push forward, which made some projects more difficult. However, I remained determined to make a difference.



I had strong support from my SU President at the time, who continuously encouraged and motivated me. Their belief in me helped build my confidence further, and I decided to take a bold step and run for SU President myself. The election week was incredibly stressful, nerve-wracking, and demanding – but in the end, I was honoured to be elected as the President of Dudley Students' Union.

As the Incoming President-Elect, I organised the SU's first Anti-Racism Festival – one of the most meaningful and impactful events I've been part of. I've truly enjoyed my time working with the SU. It's been a journey of growth, learning, and empowering others, and I'm proud of what we've achieved together."

Shaping the National Student Movement



As ever, Dudley Students' Union continues to play a leading role in national conversations, ensuring that the voices of our students influence decisions beyond our own campus. This year, we took part in the **newly formed NUS England Conference**, held in Lincoln, which has replaced the traditional National Conference. This reimagined format features a **slimmed-down, more inclusive democratic model**, designed to **prioritise collective action, collaboration, and meaningful communication**, moving away from divisive debate and towards unified progress.

President Jack, Vice President Usman Shahid, and then-Inspired Campus Leader Kaynat Ahmad proudly represented our Union at the conference. We submitted two impactful policies: "Tackling the Far-Right" and "Investing in Further Education Students' Unions". Both were successfully adopted as national priorities by the National Union of Students,



marking a significant win for our students and the wider FE sector.



This event also provided a powerful platform to **connect with fellow student leaders**, **share campaign strategies**, and **build a stronger**, **more united student movement**, ensuring that Dudley SU continues to help shape the future of student representation across the country.



National Advocacy on Tackling the Far-Right

Tuesday 3rd June, President Jack and incoming President Kaynat travelled to London to attend a national roundtable in Parliament, focused on addressing the alarming rise of the far-right, an issue that continues to grow both locally and nationally. This engagement followed a major achievement: the successful passing of our "Tackling the Far-Right" policy at NUS England, which has now been adopted as a campaign priority by the National Union of Students.

At the roundtable, Jack and Kaynat contributed to vital discussions about **the role of Students' Unions in challenging extremism** and promoting inclusive values. A key point raised was the urgent need for the **Government to legally mandate and fund Students' Unions in all colleges across England**, mirroring the model already in place in **Scotland**. As **political**, **student-led organisations**, SUs are **uniquely positioned to lead the fight against radicalisation**, empower communities, and foster democratic resilience. Their presence on every college campus is essential in ensuring **young people are equipped**, **represented**, **and protected** in the face of rising hate.



Leading the Change: Representing at the SOS-UK Sustainability Summit



This year, we proudly attended the **SOS-UK Sustainability Summit**, a national gathering of student leaders and sustainability advocates committed to

driving climate action within education. The summit provided an incredible opportunity to **connect with like-minded changemakers**, **share best practices**, and **explore innovative solutions to environmental challenges** facing colleges. We engaged in powerful workshops and panel discussions on topics such as climate justice, green skills, and institutional responsibility, leaving us inspired and energised to bring fresh sustainability ideas back to our own campus.

This year, we made it a priority to elevate the visibility and branding of Dudley Students' Union, ensuring that we are present where our members are, and that our services remain accessible, recognisable, and engaging. In line with this commitment, on 11th–12th June, we attended the SU Marketing Conference at Manchester Metropolitan Students' Union. This national event brought together experienced marketing and communications professionals from Students' Unions across the country. It was a valuable opportunity to gain insights into innovative strategies, explore creative campaign ideas, and share best practices to enhance our Union's outreach. We returned with fresh approaches to digital engagement, student-led storytelling, and visual identity, all of which will support our ongoing mission to build a stronger, more visible presence across campus and connect with students in more meaningful ways.

Campaigning for a Fair Deal for Our Future

As part of our commitment to championing students' rights and well-being, Dudley Students' Union took part in the **national "Fair Deal for Our Future" campaign**, led by the National Union of Students (NUS). This campaign calls on the Government to **properly fund further education**, address the **cost-of-living crisis**, and ensure **students are treated with fairness and dignity**, both now and in the future.

As part of the Fair Deal for Our Future campaign, Dudley Students' Union proudly took part in the national day of action known as "Money Monday" a coordinated effort where Students' Unions across the country hit their campuses to gather as many signatures as possible in support of better funding and fairer treatment for students.

Unions competed nationally to mobilise their campuses, and we're **thrilled to announce that Dudley SU topped the national leaderboard**, collecting **over 300 signatures in just one day**. This success was driven by a **dynamic, twopronged campaign**: a **strong physical presence on campus** paired with an engaging **social media push**. Our team ran an eye-catching stall, handed out **free chocolate coins**, and added an element of fun with **golden ticket prize giveaways**, creating real buzz and encouraging students to get involved.



This achievement highlights **the power of creative campaigning and student mobilisation** and firmly positions Dudley SU as a **leading voice in the national student movement** fighting for a fairer, more supportive future for all students.

Through this work, Dudley SU continues to be a **strong voice in the fight for educational justice**, ensuring that **students are heard**, **valued**, **and protected** at every level.

Continuation of our new leadership training program



During the recent half-term break, the leadership team attended a focused training session designed to empower and enhance their effectiveness. The training covered key areas essential for their roles, including project management, campaigning strategies, student engagement, and the importance of maintaining

regular office hours. The session provided a platform for leadership members to build their skills, share ideas, and develop practical approaches to better support their peers and responsibilities. Overall, the training aimed to strengthen the team's confidence and capability in leading initiatives and engaging actively within the student community.



Workshop Madness - Education Reform + National Youth Strategy



This year, we trialled a new form of student input, moving away from traditional methods such as surveys and focus groups. Instead of simply asking for feedback, we shifted towards seeking students' advice through active workshops, sessions designed to empower students to shape and guide the direction of specific topics.

One key example was a **workshop on the Curriculum and Assessment Review (CAR)** a government consultation on the future of education. **We hosted this**

session in collaboration with the Shadow Curriculum and Assessment Review Panel, which was established to amplify young people's voices in the review process. This was a vital conversation, and we were pleased to be joined by students from regional colleges including Sandwell and Solihull. Over 60 students participated in the



discussion. As a next step, we have been invited to attend the national launch of the Shadow CAR Report in Parliament on 8th July.



Another significant workshop focused on the National Youth Strategy, recently announced by the Labour Government and the Secretary of State for Culture, Media & Sport, Lisa Nandy. We designed, delivered, and facilitated this workshop, providing a platform for young people to influence the development of the strategy. Sonia Kumar, MP for Dudley, attended the session to hear directly from students, and as a result, she has raised the agenda in Parliament.



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Student Governor Conference
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Jack and Deborah, supported by Sophia, are set to attend the national Student Governor Changemaker Destinations Conference at Burberry HQ in London. This will be an inspiring celebration of leadership, impact, and student voice. Jack is nominated for a national award, fingers crossed for him! Dudley College and Dudley SU once again on the national stage showcasing the calibre of student leadership we're proud to support. We continue our commitment to empowering students as changemakers within and beyond the college.

Standing up to Racism

The Students' Union organised an Anti-Racism Festival aimed at raising awareness among students about the importance of standing against racism and promoting inclusivity within the college community. This event was developed in close collaboration with the ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) department and involved extensive planning to ensure it was both educational and engaging.

The festival featured a range of interactive activities, including:

- Dance performances
- African drumming
- Face painting
- Origami
- Henna art
- Steel band music
- Language Café





In addition to these cultural and creative activities, several **information stands** were set up to provide resources, advice, and educational materials related to anti-racism and equality. The event was also supported by **local organisations**, who contributed to the day by sharing their expertise and offering community connections.





Since the last football update:

Approximately **300 students** participated in the festival, making it a well-attended and successful event. Feedback from both students and staff was overwhelmingly positive, highlighting the event's impact on promoting awareness, encouraging dialogue, and fostering a stronger sense of community.

The Anti-Racism Festival reinforced the message that **racism has no place in our society** and that through **education, engagement, and cultural exchange**, we can build a more inclusive and respectful environment for all.

Dudley Students' Union FC has gone from strength to strength, facing off against high-profile teams such as Aston Villa and Wolves FC, an incredible experience for our players.

The Birmingham FA has partnered with Aldrich to launch the ESOL League, building on the success of the Ramadan Football League, which Dudley Students' Union hosts annually. **Recreational football continues to thrive**, with over 30 students regularly attending weekly sessions to unwind, de-stress, and enjoy the beautiful game.

Students have expressed strong interest in continuing club activities over the summer and even proposed a summer camp for local school children. While this may not be possible this year, it's a great idea we're keen to explore for the future. This enthusiasm reflects how students are not only committed to having fun but are also passionate about creating opportunities for themselves and others.

A special congratulations to **Cacious Mpofu**, **Captain of Dudley SUFC**, who was **scouted by Romulus FC!** Although he declined the offer to focus on completing his T Levels, his dedication on and off the pitch is commendable.

Looking ahead, next season will be a big one for Dudley FC. We plan to enter four leagues: the Women's League, PAN Disability League, ESOL League, and the Friday Men's League.

E-Sports Tournament

The **ESPORTS Tournament** was a huge success, proudly supported by **John Collins** from Dudley College staff. Over **50 students registered**, with **30 actively participating** in a high-energy, fiercely competitive tournament.

The competition brought together students from across the college, including **ESOL**, **Sports**, the **CAT Centre**, and **Inspired Students**, highlighting the inclusive and cross-departmental appeal of the event.

In a thrilling final, **Saif Almansour** (an ESOL student) emerged victorious against **Declan Crofts** (a Sports student with an EHCP), showcasing both skill and sportsmanship.

Due to the overwhelming interest and engagement, this initiative will now evolve into a dedicated **ESPORTS Club**, set to launch next year under the guidance of **John Collins**. This club will provide a structured and ongoing opportunity for students to **connect through gaming**, **develop teamwork**, and **build digital literacy in a fun**, **supportive environment**.
